

- To know that in the Old Testament, people of God were exiled, returned to their promised land but were still not free and believed God will rescue them by sending a saviour/Messiah to earth.
- To compare the beliefs of Jewish and Christian people relating to the promised saviour/Messiah.
- To give examples of how Christians put their beliefs about incarnation into practice.
- To know that prophesies stated that a Messiah would come to save the people of God.
- To compare biblical texts which refer to incarnation and the Messiah.
- To discuss how important the idea that Jesus is the Messiah is in the world today.
